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## Introduction

#### Danish setup

- Implementation Committee (8 ministers)
- Implementation Council (business organizations + experts)
- Five guiding principles for transposing EU business regulation
- Target for reducing administrative burdens and economic costs

#### Purpose

- To improve competitiveness
- To ensure transparency
- To high-light the political focus

### Focus of the Council

- Gold-plating is a national problem.
- The aim is to avoid gold-plating.
- Decisions to go beyond the minimum requirements from EU must be transparent and derive from a political discussion.
- Inefficiency is predominantly due to the way national implementation is carried out — not to gold-plating.

IOs. The calculation shows that approximately 28% of administrative costs can be attributed to the national level due to inefficiencies as compared to normally efficient transposition. In addition, 4% of costs stem from national obligations going beyond EU requirements.

This gives a total of 32% of all administrative costs that can be attributed to the national level.


# The five Danish principles

- 1. Do not go beyond minimum implementation
- 2. Do not put Danish businesses at a disadvantage
- 3. Use flexibility and derogations where possible
- 4. When implementing, look for alternatives to regulation
- 5. Do not come into force before transposition deadline

## Three Areas

- Proactive political lobbying
  - Identifying future EU regulation, where there is a need for early and proactive action to avoid unnecessary burdens.
- 2. Transposition of new EU legislation into national law
  - Preventing unnecessary, potentially burdensome issues to be introduced when new EU legislation is transposed into Danish law.
- "Neighbor check" best practice in other Member States' transposition
  - Checking existing implementation of EU regulation against methods used in other member states in order to identify simplifications.

### Results I


Area	Number of recommendations
Proactive political lobbying	48
Transposition of new EU legislation into national law	12
"Neigbor check"	47
Total	107

- 86 recommendations have been discussed by the Implementation Committee
- 65 recommendations are being adopted


